Introduction

Sheridan's Bachelor of Arts (Economics) program provides a three-year undergraduate program for students interested in learning the basic principles and applications of economic theory. Economics blends statistics with sociology, psychology, history, and political science to model human behaviour and guide public policy and business decision-making.

An arts degree equips students with a wide range of transferable skills, including creative thinking, critical thinking, and communication. These skills are highly desirable in a variety of employment contexts.

Students graduating with a major in Economics will be well-grounded, critical thinkers, with the foundation knowledge required to pursue an economics-related career, whether in the public or private sector, as a secondary school teacher, or a pathway towards postgraduate research in any branch of economics. Career opportunities for Economics graduates include data scientist, economist, investment analyst, teacher or public policy officer.

Course Outline

A minimum of 24 units must be taken to complete the Sheridan Bachelor of Arts (Economics). Each unit is worth 3 credit points, with a total of 72 credit points to complete the degree.

All BA students study eight (8) Common Core units, comprising of two (2) BA core units, three (3) core research-oriented units and three (3) common core Christian studies units.

The BA (Economics) Major comprises eight (8) units: five (5) core Economics units and three (3) elective units specific to the Economics discipline.

Students can select a second Major from within the Bachelor of Arts or a wide range of general elective units from other academic disciplines to complete the required 24 units to meet the graduation requirements for a Bachelor of Arts degree.

- Units from any discipline where appropriate prerequisites have been met. The faculty recommend that students consider selecting additional electives from the Economics list. Students may also choose to undertake a second Major in the Bachelor of Arts comprising eight (8) units of study from a specific discipline area, e.g. History or Chinese Studies.

The BA (Economics) is accredited by TEQSA at Level 7 of the Australian Qualifications Framework.

Graduation Requirements

To be eligible for the Bachelor of Arts (Economics) award, students must pass eight (8) Economics units, eight (8) Common Core units, and eight (8) general elective units.

Expected Learning Outcomes

A Bachelor Degree qualifies individuals who apply a broad and coherent body of knowledge in a range of contexts to undertake professional work and as a pathway for further learning.

Upon completing the Bachelor of Arts, you will be able to:

- Demonstrate your understanding of a broad and coherent body of knowledge, with an emphasis on the underlying principles and concepts of one or more disciplines within the humanities and social sciences.
- Exercise your cognitive skills successfully to critically analyse, synthesise and consolidate information, concepts and theories from multi-disciplinary perspectives.
- Critically evaluate the scholarship and professional practice of one or more disciplines within the humanities and social sciences in the light of contemporary research, of workplace practice, and of perspectives grounded in Christian scholarship.
- Communicate your understanding of current knowledge and professional practice of one or more disciplines to others through structured assignments and presentations in a variety of learning contexts.
- Demonstrate your intellectual independence through creative intellectual contributions to the study and/or practice of one or more disciplines within the humanities and social sciences.
- Apply research-based knowledge, skills and concepts from one or more disciplines within the humanities and social sciences to analyse problems and propose creative solutions across a diverse range scenarios.
- Demonstrate your capacity to seek knowledge and truth with persistence, independence, rigour, and integrity.
- Evaluate the relevance of Christian faith and practice to the pursuit of knowledge in the humanities and social sciences.
- Model self-discipline, servant leadership and respect for the dignity of individuals and groups in various settings.

Each unit you take in the Bachelor of Arts program will contribute towards the fulfilment of these broader learning outcomes.

Academic Calendar

The Bachelor of Arts is a 3-year program. Units are delivered in two 15-week semesters. Each semester comprises 12 weeks of teaching, two non-teaching study weeks, and an examination week.

Course Workload

The Bachelor of Arts may be completed in three years if taken full time, or longer if taken part-time. Students are regarded as taking an annual full-time workload when they are enrolled in a minimum of twenty four (24) or more credit points across two semesters in a given year. Students are regarded as part-time when they take less than twenty four (24) credit points per year.

A standard Bachelor of Arts unit represents 168 hours of study over a semester, including class contact hours and private study. The 168 hours typically consist of lectures, tutorials and seminars for 36 hours (3 hours per week over 12 teaching weeks) and private study for 132 hours (9 hours per week over 12 teaching weeks plus 12 hours per week over 2 non-teaching weeks). Language units generally require double the number of class hours, but a reduced expectation for private study.

Mode of Study and Assessment

The Bachelor of Arts is delivered face-to-face through lectures, tutorials and seminars, and supported by Sheridan's online Learning Management System, Canvas. Sheridan does not offer an external study option for remote students.

Assessments typically consist of a combination of formative and summative assessments, including online forum discussions, essays, literature reviews, interactive case studies, writing projects, practical assessments, tests, written reports, presentations and/or examinations.

Entry Points

Students may enter the Bachelor of Arts at the beginning of any semester in a given academic calendar year.

In the sample timetable below, the student has completed the minimum requirements for the Economics major, with the Economics units underlined.

Rules of Progression

Students intending to graduate with an Economics major must take a minimum of two 100-level Economics units, three 200-level Economics units, and three 300-level Economics units.

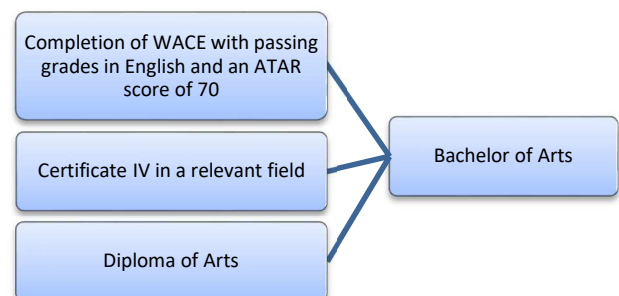
Students need to confirm prerequisite requirements for general elective units through the student portal or by contacting the Registrar.

Admission Requirements

Domestic Students

- A minimum ATAR score or its equivalent as determined by the Academic Council (the score is currently set at 70), and
- Completion of WACE or equivalent with scaled marks of at least 50 in ATAR English or ATAR Literature, or
- Completion of relevant VET Certificate IV.
- All applicants also need to complete a successful interview.

International Students

- Successful completion of an assessable

qualification from Australia or comparable qualification from selected countries, or

- High school completion and IELTS 6.0 overall with no band lower than 6.0 OR equivalent.
- All applicants also need to complete a successful interview.

For decisions of equivalence, or alternative admissions arrangements for students over the age of 19, please contact the Registrar.

Early Exit Points

Students may exit the Bachelor of Arts program after one year with a **Diploma of Arts**, provided certain credit requirements are met. Contact the Registrar for details.

Tuition

Sheridan is a not-for-profit higher education provider. Student tuition is set at the lowest possible level to reduce financial barriers to higher education.

Domestic students will pay \$825 per unit, for a total cost of \$19,800 for the Bachelor of Arts.

International students will pay \$1,600 per unit, for a total cost of \$38,400 for the Bachelor of Arts.

There are no additional expenses for textbooks and field trips. These items are fully covered by the tuition fees outlined above.

Scholarship Placements

Graduates and current staff of Baptist schools in Western Australia are invited to register for a selected number of scholarship placements offered each year. Scholarship placement students will only be required to meet the expenses of textbooks and field trips.

Location

Teaching takes place at the Perth CBD campus (Suite 18, 7 Aberdeen St Perth).
